Public Opinion Survey: Residents of Jordan

November 11-30, 2021



Detailed Methodology

- The survey was conducted on behalf of the International Republican Institute's <u>Center for Insights in Survey Research</u> by <u>NAMA Strategic Intelligence Solutions</u>.
- Data was collected between November 11th and November 30th, 2021, through face-to-face computer-assisted personal interviews (CAPI) conducted at respondents' homes.
- The sample consists of 3,010 Jordanians aged 18+ and older.
- A multi-stage sampling method was used to design a nationally-representative sample according to data from Jordans 2015 Population and Housing Census.
 - The sample was stratified proportionally by governorate and urbanicity. Primary sampling units were census blocks selected via probability proportionate to size (PPS).
 - Within primary sampling units, households were selected via a *random route* protocol and respondents were selected via the *Kish grid*.
- The data was weighted by governorate, age, sex, and educational attainment according to 2020 population estimates from the Jordanian Department of Statistics (DOS).
- The response rate for the survey was 76%. The margin of error for the mid-range of the full sample is ±1.8-points at the 95% confidence level.
- Charts and graphs may not add up to 100% due to rounding. Cited bases are weighted.
- This survey was made possible by the generous support of the American people through the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID).


When you think about the development of democracy in Jordan, do you think it is developing quickly, developing slowly, not developing at all, or regressing?






To what extent are you satisfied with the performance of public institutions in regards to each of the following?





To what extent does corruption exist in state institutions? By corruption we mean "using authority to achieve personal gains"




In your opinion, to what extent do you think the government is serious about fighting corruption in Jordan?














To what extent do you believe that the government provides you with adequate information regarding its public policies?



To what extent does false news have a negative impact on our country?






Have you heard of the committee to modernize the political system?




To what extent do you trust this committee?


Regardless of if you have heard of the committee or not, to what degree do you agree or disagree with the following selected recommendations?








Have you taken the COVID-19 vaccine?




